SPRING SHOWERS BRINGS - WEEDS PLEASE HELP US KEEP REDMOND WEED & FIRE FREE

Last summer the City experienced an unusual amount of weed complaints. Redmond City Code states that property owners are required to maintain vegetation on their property and adjacent street right of way so as not to create a fire hazard, damage property or encroach on streets or sidewalks. We understand weeds are a regular occurrence in Redmond, especially during the spring & summer months and have a few suggestions on how you can keep your property weed free!

- 1. Maintain public right of way adjacent to your property.
- 2. Participate in adopt-a-street programs.
- 3. Volunteer for annual weed pulls.
- 4. Report areas that need code enforcement or city staff attention (see contact information below).
- 5. Use native vegetation for landscaping to reduce weeding and herbicide requirements.



ANNUAL STATE OF THE CITY ADDRESS

Mayor George Endicott recently presented the 2018 State of the City address at the Chamber of Commerce's Business Expo Luncheon held Wednesday, April 18, 2018. The annual State of the City address looked back on Redmond's achievements and challenges over the past year, and outlined goals for the coming fiscal year.

The presentation highlighted the City's financial stewardship, including our A1 credit rating since 2001, and numerous annual awards for financial reporting as keys to the City's ability to maintain and build Redmond's infrastructure. The Mayor reviewed the diverse municipal services provided to our more than 28,000 residents, by City departments working together to meet the high demands of our growing community.

Several exciting announcements were unveiled, including Alaskan Airlines bringing 737s to Redmond Municipal Airport in June; two new hotel projects adding 220 rooms to Redmond's lodging capacity and a potential third hotel project on airport land adjacent to the Deschutes County Expo Center; and the purchase of 39 acres of park land north of the Dry Canyon Park complex. Mayor Endicott also discussed exciting city projects such as the newly constructed 3.5 million gallon water reservoir, the South Canal Blvd street improvement project, Homestead Canal Trail, and the Homestead Bike Pump Track planned for this summer.

Mayor Endicott continues to acknowledge the City's success has been made possible by a very supportive constituency and involvement of its citizens. A tradition he would like to encourage be continued in Redmond for years to come.

CREWS PREPARE FOR ANNUAL STREET RESURFACING & REPAIRS

The Transportation Division staff works daily to properly maintain the City's 316 lane miles of existing streets and is preparing for its annual spring maintenance work, slated to begin later this month and continue through May. Crews will be posting flyers as well as curb signs with dates and times restricting parking on the affected streets 48 hours in advance of maintenance work. We ask that vehicles be removed from the street sections and irrigation systems turned off during the specified days to allow the crews to perform their work.

The streets selected this year for maintenance treatments (i.e. seal coats, chip and crack seals) are listed below:



A YEAR LONG STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

The City of Redmond is upgrading a three mile stretch of South Canal Blvd from Yew to Obsidian Avenues. This long-awaited project replaces deteriorating pavement on an important part of the City's street network.

The improvement project will require periodic closures of streets and we would like to thank you in advance for your patience.

The South Canal Blvd improvements include:

- Left turn lanes at busy intersections
- The addition of curbs, sidewalks and bicycle lanes
- Stormwater collection system
- A new bicycle/pedestrian path alongside Homestead Canal
- Street trees and landscaping
- A new 12- and 18-inch water main to replace aging pipelines
- ADA improvements

PARKS FOUNDATION SEEKS YOUR HELP TO BUILD A BIKE PUMP TRACK

In early 2017, a group of frustrated young bike riders who had at one time or another been asked to leave the Skate Park, school and business parking lots, alleys and various other locations in town, shared with City Council that Redmond offered no real place to ride and develop their skills. Parks Manager Annie McVay worked with the youth to research options in other cities, discovering a asphalt pump

A pump track is an asphalt trail which combines rolling jumps, banked turns & switch back loops. Bike riders of all ages and skill levels are drawn to them, teaching users the basic skills of carrying momentum, balance and speed by using your arms and legs to pump your bike around the track. Tracks are designed to provide more challenges as riders get better with no changes required to the track's construction.

The Redmond Parks Foundation, a nonprofit 501c3 dedicated to improving and developing parks and open spaces within the City, is asking for your help with the Homestead Park Bike Pump Track project. The asphalt track will be the first of its kind in the state of Oregon. With a shortfall of \$50,000, the parks foundation is launching a grassroots funding campaign to make the final features of the park possible.

We are almost THERE - need your help!


Meet this native plant:

Blue Mountain Prairie Clover; Dalea ornata

- Blooms between late spring and summer.
- Grows in rocky, sandy soil.
- Needs full sunlight and low moisture.

Tips for designing a water-wise landscape:

- 1. Site Map and Wish List. Map out your property and identify areas that you would like to modify or to add, such as play spaces and wildlife areas.
- 2. Watering Zones. Identify the micro-climates of your landscape based on the moisture, sunshine, shade, and wind that various areas of the landscape receive. Each micro-climate zone will have different water requirements.
- 3. Plant Selection. Select plants that require less water, such as native plants, and are best suited for each micro-climate zone in your yard. Use your site map and wish list as a guide.
- 4. Clustering. Group plants with similar water needs together.
