

REDMOND BUILDINGS OR SITES OF HISTORICAL INTEREST

There are nine (9) buildings designated as of “Historical Interest.” In these cases, the City Council found that the buildings did not meet the criteria for designation as a historical building or site, but did find that the particular building was “of historical interest.” These sites are not reviewed by the Redmond Historic Landmarks Commission when changes are proposed, but are required to notify the City within at least 10 days in the event of a proposed demolition or major alteration and permit the City to take photographs. In addition, the City may make recommendations to the owner regarding alternatives to demolition or major alteration in cases where they may be detrimental to the building designation as being of historical interest.
